In Her Own Words: Sandra



"I'll be 67 in December. I was born in Oakland at Highland Hospital and I grew up in West Oakland. After I graduated high school, I worked in food service. All my early jobs were related to food. I moved to Pittsburgh in 2007 after my mom died, but came back to my hometown in 2013. Then, I was taking care of my great-grandson. After that, I didn't have anything to do so I found myself at St. Vincent de Paul. It is so much fun. I loved

being in Kitchen of Champions and I wanted more. I heard about Kitchen of Champions 5 years ago, but every time I tried to come something got in the way. Earlier this year, I called the center. Jackie answered and said that the current cohort had already started and if I could be down there at 3:30 I could join the class. I got there within 15 minutes. I guess they knew something was special about me. I came to the Volunteer Appreciation Breakfast in April and got to say my poem for everyone. I've never had so much fun as when I got to recite it in front of all those volunteers.

"I used to eat in the dining room. I had a drug problem and I'd come by here in the '80s for food. I was homeless. It wasn't always peaches and cream in my life. In '89 I started picking myself up and this journey has been so special.

"When the shelter cook position came open, Chef Armando called me and asked if I wanted to do it. People here say I put love into my food and they love eating it. I come volunteer on Saturdays and start prep for Sunday dinner. I work in the shelter on Sunday and Monday. I try to make every meal special. You don't want to give someone what you wouldn't eat. While I'm here, the guests get all my attention and care. My new goal is to have my own food truck. Cooking has always been in my life. My advice is: it doesn't matter how old you are, never give up on your dreams. There's always time for your dream."

In His Own Words: Larry

"Last year I was at rock bottom. I was living pretty much in my car. I learned about St. Vincent and got a bed in the shelter. I was comfortable of where I was in life. I have a very supportive family. But, after a while, your family gets tired of dealing with your addiction. After my third week in the shelter I decided I was going to sit on a crate and do what the addicts do. Then, I saw an old friend and she came to SVdP, got my things and I went directly to a recovery program. I got clean.

"I work the graveyard shift at the post office. I drive to Oakland from Suisun City. My car broke down so I

went to the shop where my buddy works and came back to SVdP to wait for the repair. It's a very safe and warm place here.

"My kids and grandchildren make me the most proud. My biggest goal is staying clean. And lowering my handicap in golf. When I'm clean, everything works for me. Thank you to my supportive friends and family. Thank you to the people in high places, especially Leslie, Jackie and Marcus at St. Vincent. God bless us all."

Livermore Stores Belongings for Neighbors



The Livermore thrift store has a new partnership with Abode Services and the Livermore police department to make sure homeless clients of Abode can store their belongings safely while they meet with case managers. The Livermore police will transport people's purses, large bags and carts to the Livermore store, where they will be kept until the client's appointment with Abode is over. Then, the client is escorted by their case manager to pick up their belongings. So far, the program has had "no hiccups at all," said Livermore Store Manager Jamie Aubry. The

Livermore store is notified that someone will need their bags stored with them either the morning of or the night before. They have made themselves open to taking bags on any given day, even with little advance notice. "It's really amazing that there are three organizations working together in this partnership. It's awesome. It shows a positive community response to homelessness," Aubry said. People who are homeless are extremely vulnerable to theft, and this is just one way to try and keep people's possessions safe.

St. Benedict Earns Urban Farming Grant

The St. Benedict Conference was awarded an Urban Farming Grant through our National SVdP office. They were one of two Conferences in the Western Region to receive the grant. "The Knights of Peter Calver Ladies Auxiliary Court 336, always enjoy the time we give to the Dining Room. Now,
