In His Own Words: Glen

"I think St. Vincent is good because a lot of people would be hungry without it. There are many services here. I am just beginning to find out about them. I am borderline diabetic and I have neuropathy. My feet are numb and sometimes I can't even feel them. It keeps my balance off. Sometimes when I lay down flat it feels like my feet are in the arctic. It is the nerves. It really is painful. It runs in my family. I am glad to know about the podiatry clinic here. And the medical van on Fridays.

"St. Vincent saves a lot of lives. I grew up in Oakland. I am inside right now. But I really need a senior bldg. A quiet place. I am not into hanging out on the streets. I have a social worker that I hope will help me. I have done my share of being homeless. It has been a journey. I thank God I am still here. My wish

is that they had a dental service. That is what seniors really need. It is so expensive. I'd give anything to get that.

"I took some left turns when I should have made a right. Now I am trying to get back on track.

"You have to keep things in perspective. You have to learn how to live. You have to learn how to take the bitter with the sweet. A lot of people depend on St. Vincent. It helps people get through."

Guests: Gloria. "I sleep on the streets. Last night a man came over and stood right by my feet. It woke me up. It was scary. It was past 12 o'clock. I asked him to please go over on the other side. I am not used to living like that. I want go back to North Carolina, but all my ID was stolen. I am waiting on my replacement. I am a Vietnam veteran and I was a civil service worker downtown."



Vincentians: The Assumption Conference is one of our most active, with twenty-five active members. The Conference's services extend throughout San Leandro and the desert areas in Oakland, places where a SVdP Conference presence is needed. As a group, the Conference conducts between fifteen and twenty home visits per month, where they bring a food box to the resident and spend in fellowship and assess their situation and what needs the Conference can support.



Staff: Elena Laron, Payroll/Accounts Payable Clerk, started working at SVdP in September of 1988 as a receptionist.

After one year, she was promoted to an accounting clerk. In the late 80s and early 90s, Laron calculated payroll by hand and using typewriters for 150 employees. Laron has seen many changes over the years, like switching from paper to computer programs, to working for seven executive directors, to changing offices to the West Oakland campus in 2016. "Everything was a learning process, but we were all learning together," Laron said.



Volunteers: John Proctor grew up donating clothes to SVdP. It wasn't until he became a successful architect and worked with an architectural firm for over 20 years that he resumed his relationship with SVdP by serving in our free dining room. "Right away, I fell in love with this place. So I've been coming here once a week for two and a half years," Proctor said. Proctor wants to use his architectural skills to create living communities for homeless people in Oakland that include wraparound social services.

Meet Our Staff: Lu Cuevas

In 1997, Lu Cuevas, our Spirituality, Formation, and Extension Coordinator, joined the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul as a Vincentian volunteer at All Saints Parish in Hayward. Lu saw women starting to make announcements in mass, and decided to join them in their ministry. "I saw someone [speaking to the church] who looked like me for the first time," Cuevas said. After a few years, Cuevas worked with Vincentian leadership to create her full time position, which is essential in connecting our community of Vincentians with our three Alameda County campuses, as well as ensure that everyone is receiving adequate support.

Cuevas has a long history of service, having honorably served in the U.S. Army as an EMT and dental hygienist from 1973-1979.

Lu is loved by the SVdP community and is a team player passionate about our mission. "Lu lives the Vincentian mission through all aspects of her life. She is a true blessing for the lives she touches," John Sterns, Community Engagement Manager, said.

Cuevas earned a master's degree from Holy Names University in Pastoral Ministry. Her education helps to guide her in being a spiritual advisor for our conference members. "The best part of my job is being present to the person standing before me. They're a present to me because of their presence," Cuevas said. As someone whose family benefitted from St. Vincent de Paul's services growing up, Cuevas is glad to be able to return the favor to the



community. "God opened a door, and I was faithful enough to step through it," Cuevas said.

dedicated their time to organizing the book department of the Fremont thrift store. Renee came across the thrift store due to her passion for reading. She says, "I love to read, and when I worked in Fremont, I found the SVdP thrift store. I was able to buy many books through the years at very reasonable prices. When I retired, I had made up my mind to volunteer at SVdP, but I really only wanted to work in the book department." Renee's wishes came true and she began volunteering in 2015, when the book department was much smaller, and, though enjoyable, it was too much work for her alone.

Fortunately, last year, Renee's "prayers were answered" and Marne joined the team. Marne has had a life full of book-related jobs, and the two became fast friends. She has been a library clerk at an elementary school and a high school, volunteered as a book mender and docent tour guide at Fremont's main library, and became the publicity chair for the Fremont



Friends of the Library. She worked as the publicity chair for twenty three years and had hoped to return to her volunteer work at the Fremont library upon retirement. Unfortunately, they weren't looking for volunteers at the time. According to Marne, "[...] when God shut that door, he opened another one for me directly to Patty and right into the Saint Vincent de Paul thrift store in Fremont and their thousands of books!" Marne fell in love with the opportunity to work in her own "private library."

In His Own Words: Will

"I like to talk with young people. I tell them when they see a drug addict they might think, 'Oh that could never happen to me.' But it can. I wanted them to look around see that all these people are here at St. Vincent for a reason. You can take one turn and it can effect your whole direction in life. I tell them to be careful and wise in their decisions. Be thoughtful. And when they know when they are taking the wrong turn, turn around.

"If you see a woman on the bus and she has been drinking you might judge her but what you don't know is her child died in her arms. You don't know what she has been going through.

"I was born in Oakland. I have lived other places but I am back here now in a little tiny studio. This is my hometown. I come in to St.Vincent when I need

something to eat. I do electrical and plumbing and have been doing it most of my life. I learned the trade from watching.

"It was my biggest blessing to have both of my parents around. My father used to say, 'I am here to teach you, not to be your friend.' My parents loved both my brother and me very much.

"We used to listen to the older people. It's different now. I'm glad to be at this advanced age. I am tired. It's been a great ride. I have had my ups and downs. I have been very blessed in my life."
